Biblical Prophecy

Purpose: so we may believe Jesus is the Christ (See John 13:19)

 Unique among religions: God is 	He declares the end from the beginning.	Isaiah 46:9-10
Man-made Idols cannot compare. Isaiah 48:5, Isaiah 41:21-23		
Prophetic evidence may be more compelling	than miracles. Luke 16:31	

- 2. Jesus' Coming was foretold by a succession of men over thousands of years, including Moses and all the **Prophets (Luke 24:27)** They were inspired by the _____ (2Peter 1:21). See also Luke 24:44-47.
- 3. **Improbable by chance!** Of the approximately 456 prophecies concerning Jesus, the estimated probability of someone fulfilling just 48 of these prophecies was estimated to be approximately 1 in 10¹⁵⁷, according to Professor Peter Stoner.
- 4. **Prophecies about Jesus are detailed, specific, and accurate** in contrast to mystics and psychics who make broad, vague prophecies or have a low accuracy rate. Inaccurate prophecy was grounds for death! **(**Deuteronomy 18:20)
- 5. Timing of Jesus' First Coming: Daniel 9:24-27 and Genesis 49:10
 - a. Sixty-two sevens & seven sevens from the issuing of the decree to restore and rebuild Jerusalem
 - i. Start from the decree by King Artaxerxes (Nehemiah 2:1) in 444 BC
 - ii. Add (62+7)*7=483 years=483*360 days, based on the Jewish year of 360 days.
 - iii. This takes us to A.D. 33 (Limbaugh, 194).
 - b. Before the temple's destruction
 - c. Before the sceptre departs from Judah
- 6. Evidence the prophecies were given before their fulfillment:
 - a. Septuagint: This Greek translation of Hebrew Old Testament was done by ~247 BC.
 - **b. Dead Sea Scrolls**: A manuscript of **Isaiah** was carbon-dated to approximately ~125 BC. Little change was found compared to a Hebrew Masoretic text in AD 916, about 1000 years later.
 - **c. Josephus' Antiquities of the Jews** indicates that portions of **Daniel** were shown to Alexander the Great when he came to Jerusalem, which took place around 330 BC. This suggests Daniel was written prior to 330 BC.
- 7. Evidence the fulfillment was not made up
- a. Early, eyewitness accounts by Christians who died for the truth
- b. Ancient non-Christian manuscripts: Tacitus (Roman historian), Josephus (Jewish), etc.
- c. Manuscript preservation, early manuscript copies, and early church citations
- 8. **How do Jews react to the prophecies?** The suffering servant in Isaiah 53 was traditionally believed to be the Messiah, but later reinterpreted it to be the nation of Israel. However, Israel was not free of violence/injustice (v.9), did not die to bear the sins of others (v.6,11-12), and is usually referred to with feminine pronoun, unlike masculine pronoun here

Prophecy Examples:

Jesus' Birth: Born in Bethlehem (Micah 5:2, Matthew 2:1), of a Virgin (Isaiah 7:14, Matthew 1:23), of a specific lineage: Abraham (Genesis 22:18), Isaac (Genesis 21:12), Jacob (Numbers 24:17, Genesis 35:10-12), Judah (Genesis 49:10, Micah 5:2), Jesse (Isaiah 11:1), and David (Jeremiah 23:5)

Jesus' Life: Entered Jerusalem on a donkey (Zechariah 9:9, Mark 11:7-9), Lived a sinless life (Isaiah 53:9, 1Peter 2:22), Preached good news to the poor (Isaiah 61:1, Matthew 11:5), Performed miracles (Isaiah 35:5-6, Matthew 11:5, Matthew 9:35, Luke 4:16-21).

Jesus' Suffering, Death, & Resurrection: Rejected (Isaiah 53:3, John 1:11), Betrayed (Psalm 41:9, Mark 14:10) for 30 pieces of silver (Zechariah 11:12-13, Matthew 27:9-10), Pierced for our transgressions (Zechariah 12:10, Isaiah 53:4-12, Psalm 22:1-18, John 20:27), Buried with the rich (Isaiah 53:9, Matthew 27:57-60), Resurrected (Psalm 16:10, Mark 16:6)

Jewish History: 1. Scattering for disobedience (Deuteronomy 28:25,64-66; Hosea 9:17; Zechariah 7:14). Some claim this is the Jewish Diaspora. 2. Nation of Israel created in one day (Amos 9:14-15, Isaiah 66:7-8). Some claim this was fulfilled in 1948 (Limbaugh, 183). 3. The re-gathering of Israel out of all countries after Jesus's first coming (Isaiah 11:10-12). Some claim this has not been completely fulfilled yet.

Jews and Gentiles, Old vs New Covenant: 1. Jesus a light to the Gentiles also (Isaiah 49:6-7), 2. All peoples, nations, and languages should serve him (Daniel 7:13-14), 3. Inclusion of Gentiles into God's People (Hosea 1:9, 2:23), 4. Blessing all the families of the earth (Genesis 12:1-3), 5. Israel provoked to jealousy (Deuteronomy 32:21), 6. The coming of a new covenant (Jeremiah 31:31-33)

Gentiles History: 1. The succession of world's empires in Daniel 2:31-35: Gold, Silver, Bronze, and Iron, representing Babylonian, Medo-Persia, Greek, and Roman empires. 2. The name of Cyrus predicted in Isaiah 44:28 before his birth
